Burn Injury (BURN)

Burn Model System Researchers Publish in *Annals of Surgery*

Researchers from [Boston-Harvard Burn Injury Model System](#) published the article, "The Impact of Burn Size on Community Participation: A Life Impact Burn Recovery Evaluation (LIBRE) Study," in *Annals of Surgery*. Increasing burn size was found to be negatively associated with selected items of work and employment and "social activities," but positively associated with aspects of "family and friend relationships." Future longitudinal studies are necessary to assess and understand the long-term social impact of burn injuries on adult populations. This information is important in developing informed recovery plans for survivors after acute care. The abstract can be found [here](#).



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
